## YOUR MONEY QUESTIONS

Last January, I asked you what you'd like to know about money matters and you sent in some great questions. I answered a few but there are more I'd love to answer for you! This one comes from Grace at M-O Federal Credit Union.


Q: How much ink do you need to make a dollar bill?
A: To answer this, I found out that the Bureau of Engraving and Printing prints 37 million notes (also called currency or bills) each day and uses about 18 tons of ink per day. After doing a little math, each note (dollar or another denomination) uses approximately 0.016 ounces of ink to print.

Here are some other interesting facts about currency:

- It costs 7.5 cents to make each dollar. Higher denominations cost more.
- Currency is made up of $25 \%$ linen and $75 \%$ cotton. It's not paper at all! It also contains red and blue fibers distributed randomly throughout. This makes it very durable and also hard to copy.
- The Bureau of Engraving and Printing has been making currency since 1862.
- The artwork on every bill is quite fancy. The numbers and designs around the edges are very detailed and beautiful. Artists work very hard to make them unique.
